Dear Friends,

“All Are Welcome”.

You will find that statement on Heslington Church's noticeboards, website, weekly notices.... just about everywhere the church has something to say about who it is and what it stands for.

It would be a mistake to think that the sentiment expressed is warm and cosy.

Far from it. It is a robustly expressed desire to make room for others, and for ourselves. It is often neither easy nor comfortable.

Sadly, the wider church at large often seems (or in fact is) preoccupied with what seem to be little more than control measures, deciding or endlessly debating the relative moral or theological positions of people of a particular gender or sexual orientation, to name just two ongoing issues across all kinds of corners of the Christian church. Some of those may be necessary for order. Some just cannot be adequately explained away.

When last did the church spend considerable time and energy asking how it may take a helpful, public, organised and pro-active role in the return to society of those who have been imprisoned? Rev Tim Jones in our neighbouring parish has very publicly helped us to understand the shortcomings of the parole system with clarity and compassion. I for one am grateful to him for the insights, as uncomfortable as they may be when we would like someone else to get on with difficult things like that.

The truth is that we've spent centuries making the church far more neat and dignified than it was in Jesus' day as he began to form a radically inclusive community of faith around the powerful and life-changing ideas of welcome, inclusion, social responsibility, honest yet gentle dealing with their own and each others faults and histories, and a resultant humility that repeated the cycle of inclusion and belonging again and again towards all they encountered in their organised meetings and daily lives. They didn't always get it right, but they started with very clear priorities.

As my colleague Rowan said so powerfully on Sunday while reflecting on the aftermath of riots across many major cities, in an authentic faith community there can be no “us” and “them”, only “us”. That is no sentimental notion. It is a concerted commitment to a sometimes costly welcome.

Here at Heslington Church, we're holding on to “All Are Welcome”. We don't really have a choice if we want to be a community founded on the life pattern of Jesus. It's not a perfect community, but hopefully that divests people of the need to think that they should be somehow better or clearer or more religious in order to take their place in it.

All are welcome.
